Celebrating Teaching and Learning at The Stonehenge School We are proud of the strides we are making in teaching and learning to ensure all students benefit from quality, inclusive education. Two key priorities in our School Improvement Plan are already shaping the way we teach and support your children:

1. Quality First and Inclusive Teaching

We are committed to ensuring that every student can thrive in the classroom through targeted, inclusive teaching. Our new tracking system is helping us focus on what matters most: your child's progress. This user-friendly tool gives teachers live data about students' achievements and areas for improvement, enabling us to offer targeted support when it's most needed.

We're also working to make this progress visible to students and parents. By encouraging Year 10 and 11 students to download the app, families can stay informed and use this data to plan revision for key assessments. Another exciting development is our focus on formative assessment. Teachers are working together to share best practices and reflect on strategies to help students demonstrate their learning more effectively. This ongoing collaboration will directly enhance the classroom experience for all.

2. Teaching and Learning with the 'Cornerstones' Approach

Our 'Cornerstones of Teaching and Learning' guide us in delivering lessons that are engaging, structured, and effective. A great example is the introduction of study journals for Year 7 and 10 students. These journals are helping students stay organised and focused by supporting revision and goal-setting. As part of re-teach weeks, students use their journals to revisit and strengthen their understanding of challenging topics. We've also integrated these goals into staff appraisals, ensuring all teachers remain focused on providing the best possible lessons. Resources and ideas to support these 'cornerstones' are now available to staff, and regular checks show that most lessons have strong, purposeful starts—an important foundation for learning.

By working together as staff, students, and families, we're building an even stronger learning environment at The Stonehenge School. Thank you for supporting these initiatives and encouraging your children to make the most of the tools and strategies in place to help them succeed.

Duke Of Edinburgh Award Evening 2024

We have recently had a number of students complete the Duke of Edinburgh Award, with 12 Year 10 students achieving their Bronze Award and 9 Year 11 students achieving their Silver Award. Completing these awards has been no mean feat and it has been truly wonderful to see the work that our students have been putting in: volunteering in our local community, such as at primary schools and sports clubs, improving their physical fitness, learning new skills such as jewelery making, writing a story, and baking one student even built a boat! All of the students completed an expedition in the New Forest (in pretty atrocious weather conditions!), and have developed new skills that will prove beneficial in the future.

A massive congratulations to all of the students who completed their award, they should be incredibly proud of what they have achieved!











Football Cup Match Updates

The year 7 boys came away victorious in a game vs Pewsey on Monday afternoon at Holders Sports Field. Stonehenge started really brightly but couldn't find a breakthrough for the opening 5-10 minutes of the game. The boys managed to grab the first goal through an excellent free kick by Maven (see below). A flurry of goals came after this with Stonehenge making it 6-0 before half time with goals from Maven (4), Harry (1) and Trevon (1).

The second half was a much tighter match and Stonehenge were unable to add anymore goals to the scoreline with the game finishing 6-0. Year 7s now head to Avon Valley in their last game to determine whether we qualify for the semi-finals of the county cup.



The year 8 boys ran out victorious 5-4 vs Wellington in the county cup. Goals came from Matthews (3), Creese(1) and Tait(1). They now head to Pewsey on Monday in an attempt to qualify for the next stage of the county cup.



Rugby - Stonehenge v Wyvern

As the game commenced, Wyvern kicked the ball to the left, where Timire passed it across to Naikausa. He was quickly tackled, allowing Wyvern to capitalize on the situation and score a try. On the following play, Wyvern had possession again, but Stonehenge swiftly regained the ball with a solid tackle from Rabuli. He passed to Limbu, who then passed to Namata, who made a brilliant run to secure our first try. Unfortunately, Welden missed the conversion, preventing us from equalizing. During our penalty, R. Kemp kicked the ball forward, and Batikaikai caught it, making the score 12-7.

In the next play, Stonehenge won the ball after a scrum turnover. The ball was passed to Limbu, who executed an impressive solo run down the field to score a try. Welden successfully converted, bringing the score to 19-7 just before halftime. Wyvern managed to narrow the gap to 19-17, but Stonehenge added another try with Namata and a conversion from Welden, increasing the score to 26-17. Wyvern scored one more try, but it wasn't sufficient, and Stonehenge emerged victorious with a close 26-24 scoreline.

Trip to Stonehenge for the Lunar Standstill

Last Friday, some Year 8 students enjoyed an unforgettable visit to Stonehenge with English Heritage to mark the Major Lunar Standstill. The day began with a captivating talk by Simon Holbeche, Bath Astronomers, about the astronomical significance of the event. This was followed by a private tour of the iconic Stonehenge site, offering a unique opportunity to explore its mysteries up close. Ollie B said "It was astounding to get to see Stonehenge up close - I've never been before!"

Students then participated in a hands-on workshop, brainstorming how the ancient monument might have been built. The session sparked plenty of creativity, with one imaginative student even suggesting the use of time travel and dinosaurs to assist in its construction! Lily C said "I enjoyed the lecture about Astronomy and the Lunar Standstill. I also now know how Stonehenge was built using A-frames and wood blocks."

The trip concluded with a fascinating lecture by Imad Ahmed, Director of the New Crescent Society, who explored the intriguing links between The Kabah, Stonehenge, and the Major Lunar Standstill.

The experience was a wonderful blend of STEM, history, and creativity, leaving students inspired and curious about the ancient world.
