Social Development: Learning to listen, respect others' viewpoints, and express themselves clearly fosters positive relationships. 

Year 11 STEM Residential to London: A Trip to Inspire the Future

This week, our Year 11 students embarked on an unforgettable STEM Residential to London. The three-day experience was packed with learning, exploration, and entertainment, designed to inspire students and provide unique insights into the world of STEM. From iconic landmarks to hands-on scientific workshops, every moment was both educational and enriching.

Monday: Exploring London's Iconic Sights

The journey began in Greenwich, where students boarded a Thames River cruise. The lively and humorous commentary provided fascinating facts about London's history and landmarks, setting the tone for an exciting



Following the cruise, the group visited the London Eye. The flight offered panoramic views of the capital, with students pointing out landmarks they'd just learned about during the river cruise. Excitement was high as everyone marveled at the scale and beauty of the city.

The day continued with a walking tour through London, ticking off some of the most iconic landmarks: Big Ben, Westminster Abbey, Buckingham Palace, The Mall, Trafalgar Square, and Leicester Square. Despite a busy schedule, the students remained engaged, soaking in the significance of each site and capturing plenty of memorable photos.

To cap off the day, the group indulged in an unlimited buffet at Pizza Hut, a perfect way to refuel after all the walking. Spirits were high as the group reflected on the day's adventures before heading to their hostel for a well-deserved rest.

Tuesday: A Day Immersed in STEM

Tuesday was the highlight of the trip, dedicated to the NST STEM Conference at the Science Museum. The day began with an energetic introduction by Jon Chase, better known as Oort Kuiper the Science Rapper. His STEM-themed rap captured the students' attention and set a fun, engaging tone for the day.

The first speaker, Flow Adepoju, delivered an insightful talk titled "The Science of Beauty." Flow shared her journey into the cosmetic sciences, revealing the innovative research and technology behind beauty products. Students were captivated by her blend of science and creativity. The final speaker, Alyssa Blackledge from National Grid, inspired students with her career story, transitioning from school to becoming an Associate Project Manager at one of the UK's largest energy companies. Alyssa's talk highlighted the opportunities available in STEM fields, and her practical advice resonated with the audience.

Stonehenge students TJ, Charlie, Oliver, and Deacon impressed everyone with their thoughtful questions during the Q&A session.

After the talks, students participated in two interactive workshops led by lab technicians from Imperial College London. The first workshop involved hands-on experimentation with agar jelly and petri dishes, where students produced beta-carotene cells from cheese. This experience introduced them to biochemical processes and the importance of lab precision.



The second workshop challenged students to solve lab safety emergencies. Teams worked collaboratively to address scenarios such as a broken fumigation hood, a fire, and even a flood. The activity was both practical and engaging, encouraging critical thinking and teamwork.

In the afternoon, students had free time to explore the Science Museum before heading to the Natural History Museum. Here, they admired exhibits ranging from dinosaurs to the Earth Sciences galleries, further expanding their understanding of the natural world.

The evening continued with dinner at Bella Italia, providing a delicious Italian meal before a festive stop at the Trafalgar Square Christmas market. The perfect ending to the day was the West End performance of SIX, a vibrant and modern retelling of the lives of Henry VIII's six wives. The students were enthralled by the energy and creativity of the show, making it a night to remember.

Wednesday: Astronomy and History at Greenwich

The final day began with a visit to the Royal Observatory in Greenwich, where students explored the Flamsteed House Museum. This historic location provided insight into the development of astronomy and timekeeping. Standing on the Prime Meridian Line, students had the unique experience of spanning two hemispheres at once.

One of the highlights of the visit was climbing the spiral staircase to view the Great Equatorial Telescope, a monumental piece of scientific history. The exploration continued at the Peter Harrison Planetarium, where students had the chance to touch the Gibeon Meteorite and learn about celestial phenomena in the micro gallery.

Reflections on the Trip

The Year 11 STEM Residential was an extraordinary experience that combined academic learning with cultural exploration. Students had the opportunity to engage with professionals in the STEM field, participate in cutting-edge scientific experiments, and explore the rich history and modern innovations of London.

From standing on the Prime Meridian, to experimenting with lab techniques, and attending a West End show, the trip provided a perfect balance of education and enjoyment. It was a reminder of the diverse opportunities available in STEM, sparking curiosity and motivation for the students' futures.

This residential will undoubtedly leave a lasting impression, inspiring many of our Year 11 students to pursue their ambitions in STEM and beyond. We are incredibly proud of their enthusiasm and engagement throughout the trip and look forward to seeing the impact of this experience on their future academic and career aspirations.



NO PEN DAY!

Below is an image of the giant cube we built from 216 smaller cubes made on no pen day in Maths.

All year groups and classes contributed to its success. The cube is 6x6x6 or 6 cubes wide, 6 cubes deep and 6 cubes high. It has a surface area 216 as well as a volume of 216. And is the only size of cube possible where the surface area and volume are equal.

Each small cube was made by folding 6 pieces of paper and slotting them together without glue or tape. The students showed great resilience and perseverance in creating these cubes and worked on the project in small teams, combining their efforts at the end of the day to create the giant cube.
