#### Headteacher's Update ...

At The Stonehenge School, we are committed to fostering a respectful and responsible community. Recently, we've engaged with pupils about the importance of caring for our shared spaces, especially our newly refurbished facilities. We encourage all students to take pride in their environment by:

- Respecting School Property: Treating school facilities with care ensures a pleasant space for everyone.
- **Reporting Issues:** Promptly informing staff about any damages or concerns helps maintain our school's standards.
- Leading by Example: Demonstrating positive behaviour inspires peers to do the same

By embracing these actions, pupils contribute to a positive atmosphere that benefits the entire school community.

#### Attendance Matters

Regular attendance is crucial for academic success and personal development. Here's an overview of our current attendance:

- Overall Attendance: Our school's attendance rate stands at 90.8%, slightly below the Wiltshire secondary school average of 91.29%.
- Persistent Absence: We've reduced our persistent absence rate to 22%, an improvement of 5.8% from last year, yet it remains above the county average of 22.93%.

To support your child's consistent attendance, consider the following strategies:

- Establish Routines: Set regular bedtimes and morning schedules to help your child arrive at school on time.
- Schedule Appointments Wisely: Whenever possible, arrange medical and dental appointments outside of school hours to minimize disruptions.
- Communicate with the School: Inform us promptly of any absences and discuss any concerns that may affect your child's attendance.
- Promote a Positive View of Education: Encourage your child to view school as a valuable and enjoyable experience.

We are dedicated to providing our pupils with essential skills and knowledge:



#### ROTARY CLUB YOUNG CHEF COMPETITION

Emily Evans took part in the County level round for Young Chef on February 15th. This is the second time that Emily has got through as she did this competition last year along with Robert Dale. This round was in a professional kitchen in South Downs College, Portsmouth with around 25 other students aged 11-18. This was a whole morning event; where students served up their creations in a restaurant to be judged and admired by family, teachers and South West members of the Rotary club.

The top three students went through to the regional round; these were all Sixth Formers. Emily made a seafood risotto and seasonal fruit tart, she received fantastic feedback from the judges who informed us that she was 4th place, narrowly missing out on the next round. This is such a fantastic achievement for a Year 10 student and shows the level of dedication she had put in.

This is the second year running we have had a student go through this round; with Erin Strange competing last year. Both Erin and Emily have represented Stonehenge exceptionally well, showing off their creativity and courage in such a competitive, highly stressful competition. I am very proud and motivated as their teacher to keep entering in students for this opportunity, this will hopefully inspire students from Stonehenge to continue to apply for Young Chef and gain a similar experience.


**SCHOOL TRIPS** 






Hi

# Why am I being given this flyer?

Because it's currently against the law to ride an electric scooter on a public road, pavement or public space - such as a car park or play park.

Wiltshire Police Roads Policing Unit, the Road Safety Unit, Youth and Early Intervention Teams, and the Office for the Police and Crime Commissioner are offering information to help you make informed choices when it comes to e-scooters and e-bikes.

When making your way round your community, including going to school, you might be using your own transport of some kind - such as pedal cycles or a scooter.

We want to share important information with you about e-scooters and e-bikes, including where you can use them and what the Police can do if they see you riding them illegally.

## What is an e-scooter?

Electrical scooters (also known as e-scooters) come under the category of "powered transporters". This covers a range of personal transport devices which are powered by a motor. Examples include:

- Segways
- Powered unicycles
- Hoverboards
- U Wheels
- Go-Peds
- **■** E-Scooters

E-scooters are classed as motor vehicles under the Road Traffic Act 1988. Which means the rules that apply to motor vehicles, also

apply to e-scooters, including the need to have a licence, insurance and tax. If you cause serious harm to another person whilst riding an e-scooter the incident will be investigated in the same way as if you were riding a motorcycle or driving a car.

# Can I use my e-scooter when I go to school / out with my mates?

No. It is currently illegal (against the law) to use them on the roads/pavements or in public spaces, this includes publicly accessed areas, such as car parks and play parks. If you're riding your e-scooter in one of these places, you will risk it being seized under \$.165 Road Traffic Act 1988 and you won't get it back.

## Where can I use my e-Scooter?

You can use an e-scooter on private land with the permission of the land/homeowner, this includes your own home and garden.

However, even there, if police receive a complaint, they will investigate for using the e-bike/e-scooter/board in an anti-social manner. This means if the use of the e-bike / e-scooter / board is causing alarm, harassment or distress to others around you, the Police can take it from you and seize it under section 59 of the Police Reform Act.
